



To enhance your listening experience, adjust the equalizer on your playback system!



Most audio system default settings are designed for playing music which has a very wide frequency range. The spoken voice has a very narrow range and the players tend to boost all signals whether they are present or not.

If your system is set for music, voice only programs can sound muffled, muddy or full of bass. Some audio players need to be adjusted for voice only programs.

The Equalizer is an excellent way to tune the output for the audio programs you listen to. If you take the time to learn how to do this, it will enhance your listening experience.

Lower the bass setting. If your system has an equalizer, you can make very discrete adjustments in the bass frequencies to suit your listening needs.

WINDOWS MEDIA PLAYER 10

(Start - Programs - Windows Media Player)

- (1) Click the arrow below the Now Playing tab, point to Enhancements, and then click Graphic Equalizer. (2) Click the Turn On link, if visible, and then move the sliders to the levels that you want to use. For example, try lowering the bass (slider on far left). Hit the play button to hear how this setting sounds. Your changes are saved automatically to the Custom preset.
- (3) To control how the sliders move in relation to one another, click one of the slider option buttons to the left of the equalizer.
- (4) To revert to the default settings, click the Reset link. (5) To hide the settings, click the Close button in the Enhancements pane.

- (1) In the upper right corner, click on Tools and then Equalizer.
